I need to read some writings from the Apocrypha and Pseudepigrapha, the Dead Sea Scrolls, as well as some of the works of Philo and Josephus?

- 1. For the **Apocrypha**, several Bibles include the Apocrypha, such as New English Bible-BS192.A1; or RSV (New Oxford Bible w/Apoc—BS191.A1. Most Apocrypha of OT are also available as ebooks via Project Gutenberg and accessed by our online catalog). These are "primary sources," but if you need commentaries on the Apocryphal books, see the Anchor Bible Commentary series in our Reference collection. (Bear in mind when you search the catalog that "Apocrypha" is not same as "Apocalypse" ©.)
- 2. For **Pseudepigrapha**, the best all-round work is Charlesworth's <u>OT Pseudepigrapha</u> (2 vols): BS1830. A3; we have one set in Reference and another set in that can be checked out.
- 3. For **Dead Sea Scrolls**, use our reference works, "<u>Complete Dead Sea Scrolls in English</u>" (Ref BM487.A3 V4), or "Dead Sea Scrolls Bible" (BS895. A24). If you want to try reading DSS from Hebrew text the way it was first discovered and pieced together, try the <u>CD-ROM version</u> on the library reference computer. Even better, check out the new website of the <u>Digital Dead Sea</u> Scrolls Project of the "Israel Museum": http://dss.collections.imj.org.il/
- 4. For **Philo**, do an author search in our online catalog for Philo, of Alexandria—there are several works in our general collection, such as:
